

RUBBER STAMP REPS

Removing Standards to Limit Waste and Pollution

Dozens of House members represent districts where the majority of the constituents voted against this administration's platform, yet these representatives are acting as rubber stamps for the White House's extreme agenda rather than working for the people they represent.

Issue Background

The below Representatives voted for H.J. Res. 36, which would have repealed standards requiring energy companies to limit waste and pollution. Efforts to increase detection and repair of leaks of methane and other dangerous air pollution from oil and gas wells, pipelines, and other infrastructure are common-sense, and these standards benefit the economy, the climate, and public health. If repealed, oil and gas companies would continue generating tons of avoidable pollution, including methane, a gas 25 times more potent than carbon dioxide and a key contributor to dangerous climate change.

Members of Congress should stand up for public health, clean air, and a safe climate, and oppose this repeal because it removes common-sense standards that keep companies from wasting resources and emitting dangerous air pollution.
